NAMI Mercer: A Brief History

AMI Mercer had humble beginnings but a great destiny. In the early 1980s, several families began to meet regularly to support each other in the task of coping with mental illness in a loved one. In those days, parents were readily blamed for their children's illnesses; stigma was a major problem; and parents had very little information and no say in treatment.

These family members became the Mercer Alliance for the Mentally Ill (MAMI), which was incorporated in 1984 with Gloria Blumenthal as president. Tom and Chomy Garces later started an office in their home and began to offer classes for families, the Just Friends social group for people affected by mental illness, a helpline and education meetings, all of which are still core offerings of NAMI Mercer.

The families set to work to find group housing for their ill relatives and eventually raised enough money to buy two properties for this purpose. These were handed over to Catholic Charities in 2005. MAMI held regular public meetings in the Lawrence Library to raise awareness and provide information. A team of volunteers also began working with the staff of Trenton Psychiatric Hospital to monitor conditions, a service that continues to this day.

In 1995, MAMI opened its Lawrenceville office on Lakedale Drive and was run for six years by the Garces, who volunteered fulltime between them as counselor, advisor, office manager, press secretary and accountant.

In 2001, a banner year, a major grant for office support came in from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation; Chomy Garces received the New Jersey Psychiatric Association's Citizen of the Year Award and a new program for children, "Visions for Tomorrow," was launched. NAMI Mercer (renamed as a county affiliate of the National Alliance on Mental Illness) received the national organiza-

tion's Outstanding Local Affiliate Award for its effective public education programs and strong volunteer commitment.

In January 2002, a screening of the movie "A Beautiful Mind" in Princeton inaugurated a series of annual fundraising events that laid the foundation for NAMI Mercer's move to paid, professional staffing and its present headquarters in Lawrence Commons.

Rachel Howard, our first paid executive director, was hired in 2002, followed by Jerry Lindauer in 2003 and Sally Osmer in 2007.

In 2009, NAMI Mercer celebrates its 25th anniversary, a momentous occasion for Mercer County families whose loved ones are affected by mental illness. The 2009 NAMI Mercer Walk on Saturday, May 30, a five-kilometer circuit on the grounds of Educational Testing Service (ETS) in Lawrenceville, will mark this great occasion and give us all a chance to get together.

NAMI Mercer's Goals and Accomplishments, 2008

Inclusive Community

NAMI Mercer will increase the participation and membership of people from diverse economic, racial, ethnic and age groups in NAMI Mercer. In 2008, NAMI Mercer:

- Engaged a membership of 350 families with more than 700 individuals in our work.
- Completed the first year of paid Volunteer Coordinator, with 150 volunteers working for more than 4,700 hours. We improved processes for recruiting, training and supporting volunteers at all levels of the organization.
- Developed outreach materials for and piloted a new NAMI National educational program, Sharing Hope: Understanding Mental Health, an outreach resource for African-American faith communities, at Galilee Baptist Church, Trenton, in November.

Education and Support

We will expand the education and support services for youth and young adult consumers (ages 17-30) and their families.

In 2008 our trained volunteers and staff:

- Established a new College Outreach Committee and designed a pilot program with Rider University, reaching around 200 students in the 2008-2009 academic year.
- Taught three Family-to-Family 12-week courses for 52 people, with one course held in Trenton.
- · Trained teachers and taught the

first NAMI Basics class for 16 parents of young children in the spring and fall.

- Sponsored NAMI CARES and W.R.A.P. support group and recovery program for consumers.
- Founded a new support group for consumers, Weight Management Support Group, which is peer-led and meets monthly.
- Gathered Just Friends, our signature social program, for around 100 activities for 50 active consumer members.
- Sponsored our monthly socialization group for children, Just Kids, with 25 active families.
- Initiated a new social group for young adult consumers, Becoming Friends, with an initial membership of 12 people.
- Partnered with Greater Trenton Behavioral HealthCare to offer IFSS (Intensive Family Support System) support groups, family counseling for more than 30 families and monthly public education events.

Outreach and Awareness

We will increase the number and quality of community awareness and education events in a variety of settings in Mercer County. Our outreach and awareness activi-

- Delivered "In Our Own Voice" anti-stigma presentations to 69 different groups with more than 1,900 people (an increase of 100 percent over 2007), with 15 trained Mercer County presenters.
- · Planned collaborative outreach

activities for Mental Health Awareness Month in May with the Professional Advisory Committee of the Mercer County Mental Health Board and designed book marks that were distributed to 6,000 people in the county, through the library system.

- Engaged 24 congregations in Mental Illness Awareness Week in October in providing information on mental illness and offering prayers for consumers and their families.
- Delivered 14 presentations to civic, professional and community groups in 2008.
- Distributed mental health and NAMI Mercer information at 17 community events in all areas of the county.

Advocacy

NAMI Mercer will advocate to break down barriers to successful treatment outcomes in Mercer County. During 2008 NAMI Mercer:

- Participated on the Mental Health Board, Family Partnership monitoring of Trenton Psychiatric Hospital, Professional Advisory Council for the county, NAMI NJ Public Policy, Legislative and Family Support Committees and other mental health advocacy bodies.
- Advocated for federal mental health parity law which passed in October, 2008.
- Initiated a new partnership with Capital Health Psychiatric Screening Center and early steps for a collaborative approach to improving law-enforcement relationships.

We Couldn't Do It Without Volunteers!

AMI Mercer has a team of more than 160 volunteers who work in every aspect of our mission.

In 2008, the volunteers provided more than 5,000 hours of work for the organization.

The Helpline volunteers are on duty in our office weekly, with two volunteers per shift. Volunteers staff our outreach tables for community events and health fairs across the county.

Administrative volunteers assist with clerical and computer tasks.

Our volunteer communications team writes our quarterly newsletter, newspaper articles and other publications.

The Family-to-Family Program

has volunteer teachers who teach the 30 hour course. We have a team of 12 trained teachers and run three to four classes per year with two teachers for each class.

NAMI Basics is the course for parents of children under 18, and we have two volunteer teachers who teach the six-week class twice a year. Our consumer support and

Annual Financial Report, 2008

The year 2008 was a very strong financial year for NAMI Mercer.


Highlights for the year

- In January 2008, NAMI Mercer had its annual major fundraising event, Night Out With NAMI. The net income for the event was \$89,197, or 28 percent of our income for the year.
- Income from grants from corporations, foundations and congregations increased by 67 percent in 2008 from 2007, in part due to new funders. Shire Pharmaceuticals, Church & Dwight, Fred C. Rummel Foundation, Merancas Foundation and Princeton University Chapel were new funders in 2008.
- A very significant factor for our income was the receipt of a bequest of \$40,000 from the Anna Leigh Charitable Trust.
- During the year, we were able to make some improvements in our office space and replace some of our computers to increase the efficiency of the overall operation.
- The Annual Appeal was stronger than in years past, with 115 donors contributing.

We are very pleased to have ended the year with a surplus, given the economic climate.

social groups, NAMI Care, WRAP, Just Friends, Becoming Friends and Just Kids all have volunteer leaders for their 150 activities each year.

NAMI Mercer has 15 trained In Our Own Voice speakers who make presentations all over the county, reaching around 2,000 presentations in 2008 with their hopeful, anti-stigma message.

Many people volunteer on NAMI Mercer committees and the Board of Directors, overseeing events and steering the organization in its mission. NAMI Mercer is represented throughout the state by volunteers involved in advocacy work to improve mental health facilities and policy—visiting state hospitals, serving on public boards and participating in NAMI New Jersey public policy and legislative committees.

NAMI Mercer volunteers include youth in high school, college student interns, senior citizens, family members and consumers, women and men, people who come to the office to work and people who work from their homes or in other locations.

In 2008 we have greatly enhanced our coordination of volunteers with the addition of a part-time volunteer coordinator, Tom Tompkins.
